Why a newsletter? Well, the
RM occupies 441.74 square kilometres, and our popula-tion of 1,270 people is fanned out across the land. There's plenty of things happening in our municipality and sharing information with residents is important.

For Reeve Frances Smee, the newsletter provides an opportunity to share facts with residents. COVID-19 closed the world down and made meeting in person a non-starter.

Pandemic or not, council meetings in any municipality have been known to draw smaller and smaller crowds over the years, so often times the business of the municipality lives within council chambers.

While there's an old adage that 'no news is good news,' sometimes a lack of information sharing can lead to rumours that, like wildfire, tend to spread.

"It is incumbent upon us to let the community know what we're doing, and then they can decide whether they like it, appreciate it, or want changes," Smee said.

The RM, as many will know, is home to CentrePort, North America's largest inland port with 22,000 acres of industrial land that is accessible by truck, rail and air. More than 50% of the CentrePort lands are located in Rosser. In the coming months, we'll look at what's happening in CentrePort and delve into the unique opportunities and significant benefits it has brought to the RM and its residents.

## Meet your Reeve and members of Council

Residents of the RM of Rosser are represented by a reeve and four members of council.

The RM has four wards and one councillor is elected from each ward. At election time, any resident or property owner can run for municipal council and they can run in a ward of their choosing. You do not have to live in the ward that you run in.

Once elected, councillors represent and work for the entire community, not just the ward in which they were elect-

**Reeve Frances Smee** I have been on council for 3 terms/almost 12 years.

As with so many municipal officers, I was asked to run by residents of the community.

Having no previous council experience, I questioned what I would have to offer but I was willing to do what I could.

I have met many wonderful people and have had the opportunity to learn so many things. It has truly opened up a whole new world for me and for that I will always be grateful. I'm also grateful for all the councillors and RM staff members I have had the privilege to work with over the years.

My great-grandparents and my grandfather came to Rosser in 1901 and purchased a farm based on the wonderful well-water they discovered when they asked for a drink. Apparently, it was the first thing my great-grandfather did whenever they went to look at a farm to purchase. Needless to say, they found what they were looking for here in Rosser.



My knowledge continues to grow day by day, allowing me to make better decisions each time we are tasked to do so.

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

### RM part of newly created Redboine **Watershed District**

The RM of Rosser is part of the newly created Redboine Watershed District.

The Province of Manitoba announced two new districts recently, Redboine and

the Pembina Valley Watershed District.
The RMs of St. Francois Xavier and Woodlands are also part of Redboine. Pembina Valley includes Emerson-Franklin, Rhineland, Montcalm and the Town of Altona and City of Winkler.

The restructuring of the former Conservation Districts along watershed boundaries is an idea for which Rosser has advocated for the past several years," said Reeve Frances Smee.

"We have closely followed the process of re-alignment and are now very pleased to be joining the Redboine Watershed District.

Jeff Wharton, the Minister of Environment, Climate and Parks, announced the two new districts last month.

Our government recognizes the importance of managing water on water-shed boundaries. These efforts play a key role in building climate resiliency within the province, helping to protect water, soil and habitat," Wharton said.

'We are pleased to welcome new municipal partners to the Pembina Valley and Redboine Watershed Districts, resulting in increased watershed programming for producers and residents of the municipalities.

Rosser remains, as well, a member of the Netley Grassmere Watershed District, which covers the eastern border of

We believe strongly in the work undertaken by the watershed districts including water retention, restoration of wetlands and other natural habitats, the protection of water, and climate resilien-

cy," Smee said.
"We look forward to partnering with our municipal neighbours through the Redboine Water District to protect and enhance our community now and into

Gary Wasylowski, Board Chair of the Manitoba Association of Watersheds, welcomed the creation of two new en-

'Manitoba Association of Watersheds is pleased to see the further expansion of the Watershed Districts Program and thanks the Province of Manitoba and the new partner municipalities for their support," Wasylowski said.

'The importance of Manitoba's 14 watershed districts has never been greater than it is now as we collectively seek to build

climate resiliency within the province."
Watershed districts are established under the Watershed Districts Act and are formed as a voluntary partnership between the province and local municipalities to protect, restore and manage water resources on a watershed basis.

Watershed districts offer a wide range of programming to advance integrated watershed management plans and meet local priorities including water retention, erosion control, the restoration and enhancement of wetlands and other habitat and work with agricultural producers to protect Manitoba's water quality.

Since 2020, Manitoba has increased funding to the 14 watershed districts by \$560,000, to a total of \$5.873 million in 2021/22. In all, 111 of the 137 municipalities in Manitoba are part of the program, making significant incentive programming around water management available to residents of the partnering municipalities.

### Rosser at a glance



The Rural Municipality of Rosser was incorporated in 1893. It's located in the Winnipeg Metro Region and is bordered by the City of Winnipeg, and the RMs of St. Francis Xavier, Headingly, Woodlands, Rockwood and West St. Paul.

According to Statistics Canada's most recent survey numbers from 2021, Rosser has 1,270 residents, 424 occupied private dwellings and a population density per square kilometre of 2.9. The RM's total land area, in square kilometres, is 441.74.
